The primary goal of medical education is to produce good physicians possessing sound training in quantitative human biology. The four-year curriculum leading to the M.D. degree is designed to cope with the expanding body of medical knowledge. An accelerated three-year optional curriculum is also available. Medical students have a wide range of opportunities to explore the subjects that particularly interest them. Beyond the Medical School and the award of the M.D. degree, all graduates are obliged by requirements for specialization and/or licensure to undertake additional formal education or training.

Only the minimum course requirements are listed; students will take additional classes to complete their program. The following is a suggested sequence of courses; variations are possible.

Twenty-seven credits from the following: psychology, anthropology, history, sociology, economics, philosophy, or a modern language.

The Doctor of Medicine (M.D.) degree takes four years in Medical School following at least a B.A. or B.S. degree.

Applicants take the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) in spring or fall the year prior to the year of entry.

Application deadline: November 15 of year preceding entry. No exceptions are made.

Admission requirements: Admission is based on ability and scholarship as indicated by the college records, the MCAT; on personal qualifications as evidenced by evaluation; by the student's participation in extra-curricular activities; and by personal interviews.

The Minnesota Transfer Curriculum and Itasca's Associate in Arts Degree

The public higher education colleges and universities in Minnesota have developed a common liberal education curriculum called the **Minnesota Transfer Curriculum**. Students who complete the Associate in Arts degree at Itasca Community College will have automatically met all Minnesota Transfer Curriculum requirements. Students desiring to complete the Minnesota Transfer Curriculum requirements and then transfer without the Associate in Arts degree may pick up a MNTC checksheet in the Counseling and Career Center.
